EOC Charter High School 2021/2022 Quarter 3 Student Perception Report

School Vision: The vision of our school is to provide at-risk students with a <u>calm, safe learning environment</u> where they feel they <u>belong</u>, and are <u>capable</u> of earning a <u>diploma</u>.

School leadership designed this survey as a result of the 2021-2022 Comprehensive Needs Assessment. The survey is structured in line with our school culture needs and based off from questions similar to the *Tripod Project*® which has been refined for more than a decade to achieve a high level of reliability. Analysis of the *TripodTM* surveys in multiple districts have shown less than one percent of students answer the survey in a biased manner.

The survey only includes the perceptions of student's that maintained continual enrollment in the quarter 3 and does not include students that did not complete the quarter or who started the quarter and dropped out early.

Because this is a school designed survey by the leadership of the Educational Opportunity Center Charter High School, the results of the survey cannot be compared to other schools in the nation, state or local area. The test does establish a point of reference for having honest conversations about what is occurring in the classroom; helping understand the classroom learning conditions; and offering insight into teaching practices, student engagement, climate and student culture. Survey results don't only help individual teachers plan professional growth, but also identify school trends and patterns from the perspective of our students. Student perception surveys can be crucial tools for establishing school goals and actions.
