# VI. SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Brian Grossenburg reported the following:

#### A. Enrollment Status

- Enrollment is at 110 with an average of 73 students attending a day
- There is a waiting list

#### B. Monthly Grant and Finance Report

• FY22 IDEA Consolidated (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act)

- The grant received final approval from the state and expenses can be allocated to paraprofessionals that work with students with special needs
- ESSER I (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds)
  - o Currently in completion report status
- ESSER II (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Funds)
  - o First reconciliation has been completed
  - o Pending invoices for purchased items
  - Will do reconciliation on a quarterly basis, unless its discussed otherwise
- FY22 Small Rural School Act (SRSA)
  - Received confirmation from the US Department of Education, the amount increased by \$2,713.00

# C. Teacher Performance Incentive Plan Under Arizona's Classroom Site Funding (Formally Prop 301)

The following adjustments were made to the Teacher Performance Incentive Plan.

- Goal Area 3: State Academic Performance Indicator
  - o Due to state moving from AzM2 to ACT for state assessment
  - AzM2 will still be given to 10<sup>th</sup> graders and ACT will be given to all 11<sup>th</sup> graders
- Goal Area 6: Teacher Attendance
  - Increasing the number of days a teacher can be absent from 6 to 10 days

# D. Wellness Policy 2021-2022

Judith Castro made the motion which was seconded by Antonio Zuniga. The motion passed, and the meeting was adjourned at 8:36 a.m.




# **Current State of Pandemic**

#### Other Information

- 1. HB2898 (Laws 2021, Ch. 404, Sec. 12) prohibits schools from requiring face coverings for students and staff during school hours and on school property or to participate in in-person learning.
- 2. CDC recommends indoor masking for vaccinated individuals in public indoor settings in areas of the country where there is substantial or high transmission as of July 27, 2021. Currently, all counties in Arizona except Yuma and Cochise meet this definition. Additionally, it recommends universal indoor masking for all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to schools, regardless of vaccination status.
- 3. HB2898 (Laws 2021, Ch. 404, Sec. 12) states schools may not require a teacher or a student to receive a vaccine for COVID-19 to participate in in-person learning.
- 4. SB1824 (Laws 2021, Ch. 409, Sec. 12) states an immunization for which the FDA has issued an Emergency Use Authorization may not be required by DHS for school attendance.
- 5. Districts retain the ability to close campuses due to COVID-19 if they feel it necessary under their authority/obligation to protect student/staff safety. All Executive Orders related to school closure are expired or rescinded. (EO 2020-04, 2020-41, 2020-44 and 2020-51)

- 6. As of August 2, Phoenix Union High School District is the only known district mandating face coverings.
- 7. On August 5, two families notified the school that students within household either had contracted the COVID 19 virus or come into direct or prolonged contact with the COVID 19 virus. One family reported that adult members of the family had been vaccinated against the COVID 19 virus. The school has initiated steps to ensure all students can access live classroom instruction through remote technology.
