Principal Grossenburg stated, next month the Board will be looking at a curriculum called Be Proud! Be Responsible! that is offered through the County Health Department. It focuses on many topics that are related to sexual education. Based on Arizona law, the Board has to review and approve the curriculum before the County Health Department can come in and present the program.

Michael J. Sabath commented that he enjoyed the graduation this year, it was excellent and gave kudos to all those involved. He is willing to assist with anything that the school needs to encourage graduates to attend college.




Student Perception of Connectedness


The score represents the perception of 83 students that attended the 2024/2925 school year.


Student Perception of Affective Factors Reasons for Absences






Strategies to Support Attendance
